#### How Are VT's Children?



- Ranks 1<sup>th</sup> in the country for access to education, economic, and community opportunities
- Ranks 1<sup>st</sup> in the nation to have a baby

 Ranks 4<sup>th</sup> in the country for afterschool programming

### How Are VT's Children?



How many children 0-8 live in VT?

- 57,412 children age 8 or younger
- 9.2% of Vermont's total population
- Approximately 6,000 new births annually

Of those, how many live in poverty?

- 2 out of 5 Vermont children under 6 live in low-income families
- 26% of children who go into foster care are under 3
- 44% of births covered by Medicaid

Are kids ready to learn?

- 50.1% enter kindergarten not ready to learn in 2012-2013
- 32% of 3<sup>rd</sup> graders read below grade level
- Among children living below the poverty level, that rate increases to 45%

# How Are Windham County's Children?

How many children 0-8 live in WC?

- 3992 children 8 years old or younger
- 6.7% of total county population

Of those, how many live in poverty?

- 1 in 7 children under age 6 live in poverty
- 1 in 5 children are food insecure
- 30% of Windham County homeless were children


Are kids ready to learn?

- 47.3% enter kindergarten not ready to learn (2013-2014) \*SU's Avg
- 47 of 62 STARS-rated programs have 3, 4, or 5 stars
- 35 of 62 STARS-rated programs have 4 or 5 stars

## Conditions for Healthy Brain Development


- Relationships: nurturing and responsive relationships with adult caregivers

#### Returns per Dollar Invested



# Result 1: All children have a healthy start

- Ensure access to prenatal care, child health services, including preventive services and dental care, and support services for adults, including mental health and substance abuse treatment
- Ensure that all children have access to adequate nutrition at home, in early learning and development programs, at school, after school and during the summer



# Result 2: Families & communities play a leading role in children's well being

- Engage with families as their child's first and most important teacher
- Promote family-centered employment policies that support the physical and social emotional needs of children and their families



# Result 3: All children & families have access to high-quality opportunities that meet their needs

• Strengthen the quality of early childhood services throughout the early childhood system through a focus on alignment and best practices



# Result 4: VT invests in prevention & plans for the future success of children

- Increase the early childhood focus in health care payment reform efforts
- Increase public awareness about the importance for Vermont's of investing in children's early years



# Result 5: Data & accountability drive progress in early childhood outcomes


- Increase the knowledge, experience and application of Results-Based Accountability (RBA) as the accountability framework for the Early Childhood Action Plan
- Enhance data and the use of data to inform policy and practice

## Vermont's Early Learning Challenge Grant
